





Remember back to 1989, when a technology consultant from Fixed Income was asked to join the folks in Equities to help them out on a little project.


From this first meeting came a whirlwind of trips, conference calls, meetings and great

I met Hadar and Lois at a corporate event in Zurich almost fifteen years ago. My exhusband had asked me to have dinner with a business contact and his wife. I must confess that by then I could hardly find any trace of my early enthusiasm when those evenings represented the only opportunity of adult conversation for me. I had lost count of how many business dinners I had attended. I certainly did not

need to 'wipe my neighbour's mouth', nor pick up the carrots from the floor, but despite these apparent advantages, I usually returned home knowing that the anonymous person who had spent the evening eating next to me would remain forever a stranger.

But that night I realised how special our evening was going to be the

moment we met in the restaurant. Hadar's stories took us all the way to Japan and back, before the main course arrived, and to this day I am convinced that the waiter thought that Hadar spoke fluent Japanese. don't remember exactly when we got home, but I knew then, that the Pedhazurs were in my life to stay. There was no way we could forget them. Halloween arrived to Zurich mid October with several postal packages that Lois carefully



assembled for each of my children.

"Because I know you, I have been changed for the better, I have been changed for good." $\begin{tabular}{ll} \hline \end{tabular}$


